## **Economic Vision and Plan Development Work to March 2016**

### **Three Main Strategies**

- 1) Strategy 1 (Agenda Item 8) – To progress the Economic Vision and associated Action Plan sufficiently so that it provides the basis for development and funding, and underpins Portland's opportunities arising from a devolved approach to these themes. To support the Coastal Communities Team and Community Economic Development Frameworks. This work to be overseen by the Economic Vision Board.
- 2) Strategy 2 (Agenda Item 9) – To produce a Neighbourhood Plan Framework identifying policy areas and first draft policy statements which are built on evidence base work to date, emerging strategies and policies. This work to be led by Paul Weston using the proposed workplan.
- 3) Strategy 3 (Agenda Item 10) - To raise awareness, build capacity and carry out research with outreach by members of the Town Council and others to inform decisions around acceptance of the purpose and focus of the Neighbourhood Plan and progressing this. To provide an improved basis for members in progressing planning matters in future. To be led by the Management Group using output from Paul Weston and Andy Galpin's policy schedule.

#### **Why?**

- Although the Local Plan has been agreed there is still a risk of ad hoc and unplanned development applications outside of the current development boundaries.
- An improved basis for influencing the design and location of applications on sites already identified in the Local Plan.
- An improved opportunity to support the Economic Vision at the earliest stage by having a localised planning policy framework in place.
- To give greater confidence to members of the Town Council in dealing with planning matters and similarly the competence of the Council in the eyes of the resident population.

#### **How?**

- 1) Strategy 1 – Economic Vision Board: Using an agreed action plan developing the initiative framework around an agreed vision, themes, aims and objectives. Funded by Coastal Communities Team and other funding streams.
- 2) Strategy 2 – Paul Weston's Workplan Report: A draft Neighbourhood Planning Framework produced by Paul based on the current strategic context and local evidence base with regular liaison among the Working, Management and Vision Groups. This work is consistent with the project plan and work schedule. Budget – five consultant days as proposed.
- 3) Strategy 3 – Working Group: A series of workshops etc will be established for members and others using Andy Galpin's outline framework. This is informed by Paul's draft Framework and the Vision work as appropriate. Budget TBC by should be seen as part of a training programme for members.

## **Plan Update: Economic Vision, Action Plan and Executive Summary**

A further workshop was held on the 23<sup>rd</sup> November when stakeholders were presented with the latest versions of the Vision document and Action Plan. There was general agreement of the Vision document and in particular the strategic objectives shown. Headline targets may need a further review. It was recognised that the Action Plan was a working document which may change in terms of presentation and timelines. There was also a need to look at resourcing.

In order to meet the requirements of the funding received via Coop's UK the second part of the meeting looked at a number of areas where community-led action could stimulate economic opportunities. These were Tourism, Enterprise and Employability, Land Trust and Energy. Following these group sessions several amendments to the Action plan were proposed and action groups formed to progress each theme.

The above matters will be discussed and confirmed at the Economic Vision Group meeting on the 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2015. Following that an updated Vision document and Action Plan will be issued to the Neighbourhood Plan Management Group for information.

In addition the next stages will be approved. The current proposals are to provide an opportunity to comment online about the Strategic Objectives and produce an executive summary of the Vision document for distribution.
